VISIONARY PROJECTS.

II.

Another project, even more wildly imaginative, was nothing more or less than a proposal to solve the Northwest Passage problem by the aid of dynamite. This explosive was to be the active agent employed, but the projectors based their prospects of success on the theory, which has received the support of science, that the climates of the earth are undergoing a gradual change. Since the Glacier Period, it was argued, winters have

been becoming less severe, and even in the extreme north the cold has been diminished in intensity. The conclusion was that the immemorial ice-floes of the Palaeozoic Sea are of inconsiderable thickness, and that, if once broken up and set in motion, they might be removed by means of the currents which set from Behring's Straits to the Atlantic, leaving an open sea round the North Pole. All that was wanted, said the projectors, was the initial impulse, and this could be given by dynamite; the icebergs have no wish to carry on their obstructive policy, but they must be provided with an excuse for disappearing. "When that excuse has come, they'll do it on compulsion," like Mr. Gilbert's hypocritical curate. So, some favourable summer, it was proposed to blast a way from Behring's Straits to Baffin's Bay, trusting to the currents to keep the passage open in the years to come. As in the case of the Sahara Sea, this open water in the Arctic regions was expected to modify the climate of the adjoining continent and render habitable the desert tract from Hudson's Bay to the Mackenzie River, and from Lake Athabasca to Prince Albert Land. If the genius of the Irish-American dynamiter could find an outlet in this direction, he would be more usefully employed than in crusades against public buildings in London, and Satan would no longer rack his brains to find new mischief for the unemployed hands of the Irish Republican Brotherhood to do.

CHURCH MISSIONARY GIRLS' SCHOOL FOOCHOW.

Much has been written and said of late with reference to China's great awakening, especially her adoption of Western education both for boys and girls; truly marvelous is the change and the rapidity with which it has come about. Our celestial friends however rather seem to be "trying to run before they can walk." A casual visitor might easily go away satisfied that the Chinese had mastered the art of education. Large school buildings of two and three stories, built on Western plans, are rising up on all sides; various kinds of school apparatus are imported, the walls are hung with charts of every description, physiological, astronomical, geological, geographical and botanical, and the different curricula appear on paper to be all that is to be desired. The boy students discarding the scholar's gown are put into uniform, in order that they may drill the better. But when one comes to look a little deeper, one soon sees there is a probability of a too optimistic view being taken in regard to the true value of the work which is being accomplished. For example when lately asking a master connected with Government schools, if he could obtain some statistics for me as to what women's normal work was being carried on by the Government, he answered "I will send you two replies, one the official report and the other what is really going on". Again, I am told that one of the largest educational buildings in Foochow city, although completed nine months ago has not yet got a single student in it and my informant wittily characterised the Chinese by adding "and no doubt the masters' salaries are regularly drawn!" In many schools where full work is supposed to be going on, the visitor upon pointing to any special chart or apparatus, and asking how many hours are given to that particular study is repeatedly told "It is not taught at all for no master knows anything about it" and so the curricula which look so well on paper are very different from those in practice!

One of the mistresses in a Government Normal School told me she had learnt all western knowledge in Shanghai in two years and a half. Though much awed in the presence of such colossal knowledge, I asked to be allowed to hear the children sing, for at the time she was engaged in teaching singing with the aid of a harmonium. It turned out she did not even know her notes, and her pupils were not only totally oblivious of semi-tones, but the so-called singing resulted in a few guttural sounds in their throats. This lady-graduate was also professor of drilling, an accomplishment from which most of China's daughters were debarred only a few years ago, on account of their bound feet, and which even in mission schools had to be taught most guardedly and sometimes suppressed altogether, at the request of Native Church Councils as unbecoming for the gentler sex! But what do we see now? The above named professor herself shouting at her pupils as if drilling a regiment of soldiers, calling upon them to march with their knees waist high. Attracted by such a novel and entertaining sight, a group of boys quickly gathered on the top of a hill overlooking the school drilling ground and clapped with all the gusto and mischief of western school boys! This school before long was removed, and several others have had to be closed at the end of, or even during the first term, from inability to manage them. The wife of a Chinese Official said, to me the other day "we natives will never be able to manage schools like you foreigners. The difficulty the Chinese find in trying to manage these

establishments themselves is our opportunity, and we hope it will force them (as it already shows signs of doing) to seek their principals and Teachers from Christian Schools.

One of the greatest signs of progress we see in our own school is the power of the Christian Chinese themselves after careful training from earliest childhood to control those under them without constantly leaning upon the foreigner as of old.

We now find these Christian Native Teachers able to carry on the work themselves. For example, not long ago every subject that was taken in this school had to be taught by a foreigner now every subject can be taught by a native, fully capable of explaining and illustrating on the blackboard mathematical problems, the circulation of the blood, of exemplifying the solar system or giving instruction on the use of the globes, explaining the various routes from East to West and the wonders of the deep.

During the last year the Bishop confirmed 18 girls, and 20 others have been baptised. Several have left to be married, two unfortunately into heathen families, but in spite of some difficulty at first they have quite gained the good will of their mothers-in-law and other relatives, and are now carrying on Christian day schools in their midst.

own initiative surely we feel humbled but hopeful and full of thankfulness to HIM Who alone could bring about such a change in the ignorant, superstitious, expressionless, boundfooted daughter of the East.

A few weeks ago several officials connected with the Government Board of Education visited this school and showed the keenest interest in every department. They spoke a few words to the girls saying how pleased they were with all they had seen, exhorting the children to take every advantage of the good opportunities around them, and telling them how thankful they ought to be to the foreigners for all they were doing for them.

On behalf of the school, I gladly take this opportunity of thanking most sincerely all those who so kindly help by subscriptions, prayer, sending boxes of needlework and in other ways, not forgetting the constant and valuable care rendered by our doctor.

ITEMS OF NEWS FROM LOCAL PAPERS.

Last Thursday (the 6th instant) about 4 a.m. a fire broke out at the Yuan-hsing oil and candle shop, in Ou-wie, on the northern bank of the Min river near the Long Bridge. There being no strong wind blowing the houses with fire-walls were not consumed by the flames but about a score of ordinary wooden buildings were destroyed.

DIFFICULTIES IN ANTI-OPIUM WORK.

It is reported that the provincial authorities of Fuhkien are planning to establish an "Examination Office" into which officials suspected of being addicted to the habit of opium-smoking will be sent, and in which they will be kept till the faculty there are satisfied that the suspected

do not use the drug. On hearing this news, some of the opium-smoking officials in Foochow have applied for transfer to other places, so that they may escape from this Examination.

A SECRET DISPATCH FROM CHAO-AN DISTRICT.

It is reported that Provincial authorities at Foochow are in receipt of a secret dispatch from the Chao-an Magistrate of the Chang-chou prefecture, the substance of which is as follows:

The said Magistrate has in cooperation with Magistrate Lo Ju-tse surrounded with a troop of soldiers, the house of Hau Huan-chang, a second degree man connected with the outbreak between the Hsu and Chen clans and found in his house, a telegram from Canton with the following 8 characters:

"Do not appeal to arms until further notice." Thereupon the said second degree man was arrested and will be required to answer to the authorities.

ACCUSATION AGAINST THE PRESIDENT OF A BRANCH CHAMBER OF AGRICULTURE.

Mr. Hsieh Chai-sung the president of a branch Chamber of agriculture at Kien-ning which was registered at the Ministry Agriculture, Work and Commerce at Peking, through the Chamber of Commerce of Foochow, has been accused of several items to the said Ministry, by a certain man named Chon. It is reported that His Honor Lu Wei-ying a member of the said Ministry has received instructions to have the matter thoroughly investigated.

His Honor Ling-Ping-Chang being recommended to the Throne.

His Honor Lin Ping-Chang the President of the Provincial High School, has been recommended by H. E. Chen Pi the President of the ministry of Post and Communication, to the Throne for an audience on recognition of his efforts in enforcing the Anti-opium law.

He is expected to receive an appointment as a civil authority in Peking He is to leave for Peking on the 20th instant.

H. E. Chen Pao-shen the former Grand Chancellor who is highly respected by the gentry and influential businessmen in Foochow, has been recently recommended by H. E. Sung Shou, the Viceroy of Minche to the Throne for his good

management of the Fuhkien Mining Company, as well as government schools. He is also superintendent of the Fuhkien Railway Company.

AT the last meeting held on the 2nd day of the 5th moon, at the Provincial House in the Viceroy's yamen, many of the gentry and the members of Chamber of Commerce of Foochow were present. At this meeting H. E. Chen Pao-shen was elected to attend to the matter of having the "Buckets" covered. A decision was then made that the "Buckets" must be covered. It is believed that H. E. Chen Pao-shen can succeed in exhorting the elders in different villages to carry out the new order, because he is highly respected by the villagers. It is reported that the "Bucket" coolies are willing to obey the order, after the Dragon Boat festival.

LATEST TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

"From the North-China Daily News" Service.

THE PORTE'S PORTEST TO ATHENS.

In view of a recent outrage in Macedonia, the Porte has addressed a fresh complaint to Athens urging that efficacious measures be taken to prevent Greek bands from crossing the frontier and drawing attention to the activity of Greek officers disguised as Consular Secretaries.

ASIATIC EXCLUSION.

CHINESE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA. London via Bombay, June 3.

"The Times" learns from Vancouver that the Chinese Board of Trade has telegraphed to the Hongkong Guilds requesting them to put an end to the rush of Chinese to British Columbia and is also circularizing the Treaty Ports of China.

The Board's action is due to the representations of Mr. W. L. Mackenzie King, the Canadian Deputy Minister of Labour. Owing to the resumed influx of Chinese the Exclusion League is again active.

GREAT BRITAIN'S FINANCES.

A PROTECTIONIST AMENDMENT.

London via Bombay, June 3. In the House of Commons the Finance Bill has been passed on its second reading.

An amendment by Mr. Laurence Hardy, Conservative Member for the Ashford Division of Kent, expressing regret that in view of the growing

liabilities of the nation, no attempt had been made to broaden the basis of taxation, was rejected by 367 votes to 124.

OBITUARY.

GENERAL SIR REDVERS BULLER.

The death is announced of General the Right Hon. Sir Redvers Henry Buller, K.C.M.G., K.C.B., P.C., V.C.

General Sir Redvers Buller was born on December 7, 1839, of an old Devonshire family and married the Lady Audrey, daughter of the 4th Marquess of Townshend. He was educated at Eton and entered the 60th Rifles in 1858, his service extending down to the year 1906. During this long period General Buller was engaged in campaigns in nearly every part of the world. He served in China in 1860, in the Red River Expedition, in the Ashanti, Kaffir and Zulu Wars (in the last of which he earned the Victoria Cross) in the Boer War of 1881, where he was Chief of Staff, in Egypt and the Sudan. The war, however, with which his name is most familiarly associated is the Second Boer War, where Sir Redvers Buller was first in command of the Forces, subsequently confining his attention to the operations in Natal, the relief of Ladysmith, which was accomplished after an investment of 118 days, and the expulsion of the Boer forces from Natal. There is no need to revive the controversy that raged at one time over his conduct of that arduous campaign and the events that followed his return to England. He was given the command of the 1st Army Corps at Aldershot in 1901, but on account of an injudicious speech made shortly after his appointment and his attitude to the Government he was retired on half-pay. He was always a popular commander with his men, and whether in defeat or in victory he was able to rely upon their personal attachment to him.—Ed.

June 4.

Mr. Louis Botha, Prime Minister of the Transvaal, has telegraphed his condolences to the family of the late Sir Redvers Buller, for whom, he states, he entertained the highest esteem.

ACCIDENT TO MR. ROOSEVELT.

Tokio, June 4.

A telegram from Washington states that President Roosevelt narrowly escaped death as the result of a fall from his horse.

JAPAN.

MINISTERIAL DISSENSIONS.

Mr. K. Mizumachi, Vice-Minister of Finance, has resigned, on account of dissensions in his Department.

London, June 4.

In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. F. C. Mackarness, Liberal Member for Newbury, Berkshire, protested against the prolonged imprisonment of Dinuzulu and Natal's "shocking misgovernment of her coloured subjects."

ANGLO-AMERICAN

PENNY POSTAGE

London via Bombay, June 4.

Mr. Sidney Buxton, Postmaster-General, announced in the House of Commons that he had received a telegram from the Postmaster-General of the United States, stating that he accepted his (Mr. Buxton's) proposal for a penny postage rate between Great Britain and America to come into force on October 10.

THE SUGAR CONVENTION.

GREAT BRITAIN AND DENUNCIATION.

In the House of Commons, Mr. E. A. Villiers, Liberal Member for Brighton, raised the question of the Brussels Sugar Convention. He was followed by a number of Radicals who bitterly denounced the Government for prolonging the Convention, which was contrary to the principles of Free Trade.

Sir Edward Grey said that we had to consider the political as well as the economic effect of our action, and our denunciation of the Convention would have reacted prejudicially on our relations with other countries.

THE SIBERIAN RAILWAY.

RAILS FROM THE STEEL TRUST.

Tokio, June 5.

The American Steel Trust is negotiating for a contract to supply 1,000,000 tons of rails for the Siberian Railway at a cost of G. \$25,000,000.

ZOLA AND THE PANTHEON.

RIOTS IN PARIS.

London via Bombay, June 5.

Immense excitement broke out in Paris over the removal of the body of Emile Zola to the Pantheon.

A journalist named Gregori fired a revolver at Major Dreyfus as he was leaving the Pantheon after the ceremony, wounding him in the wrist. There was rioting all the morning in the Latin Quarter and 200 arrests were made.

Major Dreyfus was attacked at the moment when President Fallieres was quitting the Pantheon and the utmost excitement prevailed. It was believed that the President had been shot.

London, June 5.

Major Dreyfus' wound is not serious.

THE VISIT TO RUSSIA.

LABOUR PARTY'S MOTION REJECTED.

The House of Commons has rejected the motion of Mr. J. O'Grady, Labour Member for East Leeds, protesting, in the name of the Labour party, against King Edward's visit to Russia.

The motion suggested that Russia was forcing on the visit, in order to rehabilitate her credit.

AN OFFICIAL DECLARATION.

Sir Edward Grey, speaking in the House of Commons, said that the King was acting on the constitutional advice of his Ministers in visiting Russia.

No negotiations, added the Foreign Secretary, for any new treaty were on foot. The visit to Russia was intended to emphasize the friendly relations of the two countries.

THE PRUSSIAN DIET.

SOCIALIST SUCCESSES IN BERLIN.

In spite of the antiquated system of voting in the elections for the Prussian Diet, the Socialists have captured several seats in Berlin.

ITALY AND TURKEY.

SIGNOR TITTONI ON THE EASTERN QUESTION.

Telegrams from Rome announce that Signor Tittoni, Minister of Foreign Affairs, in speaking in the Chamber of Deputies, said that complete agreement between Great Britain and Russia regarding Macedonia would probably result from the forthcoming meeting of King Edward and the Tsar at Reval.

The capital required for the construction of the Danube-Adriatic railway, he continued, was already secured.

Italy's naval demonstration on the subject of the post offices in Turkey was fresh proof of the decisive influence of a good military organization upon foreign policy. The success of that demonstration was due to the policy of European solidarity now followed in the East.

and a new existence imparted in place of what had so lately seemed worn-out, "used up," and valueless. 

